Welcome to the Autumn 2014 newsletter

Visits to Kyleakin resulting from queries to our website:

Back in February we received a tentative enquiry by email from the Czech Republic entitled *Scotus Viator*. Kristina Vanova, the Director of a Memorial to Karel Capek, wondered if our village had a house, memorial or museum connected to the publicist Robert William Seton-Watson.

We let her know that we were aware that Professor Seton-Watson had leased Kyle House c1919 - c1951 and used it mainly in the summer months while residing at Wimbledon in London for the rest of the year. The Professor died in 1951 and his widow and family then returned to London permanently. His three children (Hugh, Christopher and Mary-Rose) all became Professors in their own right in similar fields to their father and continued to visit Skye more or less annually for the rest of their lives. Christopher the last survivor died about five years ago. Helen Macrae (whose compositions have featured in previous newsletters) first came to Kyleakin as a member of the Seton-Watson's household staff in 1934 and for several years worked for them at both Kyleakin and Wimbledon. She often recounted with pride how she had to announce the arrival at the Wimbledon residence of such Czechoslovakian personalities as President Benes and Jan Masaryk during the dark days preceding World War Two (they were of course close friends with R W Seton-Watson). Many years later in 1983 she visited Prague and the guide on request pointed out the window from which Jan Masaryk had met his untimely death. We also made them aware that other websites would give more academic information on the Professor who was descended from a Scottish noble family called Seton.

After this initial correspondence it turned out that a young couple representing the Karel Capek Memorial were planning to relive a journey that the Czechoslovakian playwright and his wife had made in the UK back in 1924 in the actual veteran 1924 Skoda used on the original journey and a visit to Kyle House was an essential part of the revived tour. With gracious permission and hospitality from the present owner of Kyle House, Kirstie Phipps, we met with Zdenek and Petra Vacek (pictured below) at the end of May and shared with them some of Helen's memorabilia of her time with the Seton-Watsons and their ongoing friendship including letters, books and photographs. Unfortunately Kirstie couldn't be on Skye at the time but her friend Berta prepared afternoon tea and led us all on a delightful tour of the house. Our guests we think were more than satisfied with their visit as we were too. Mr Vacek is a journalist and means to write magazine articles and possibly a book concerning Mr Capek's travels in Great Britain in 1924 and their own in 2014.





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In early July we received an email from Petra and Vdenek saying that their tour in the pre-war Skoda car was a full success and they had covered about 2800 miles in 26 days. They had managed to complete the full scheduled programme and had visited several interesting places not only concerned with Karel Capek's visit in 1924. They thanked us again for our generous hospitality, nice chat in lovely Kyle House and information related to their subject of interest. They also sent a couple of photographs which hopefully illustrate this article.



Professor Robert William Seton-Watson specialised in East Europe in the early twentieth century and held seats at the School of Slavonic Studies in London and at Oxford University. He was deeply involved in the reforming of nations in east Europe following World War One and was treated as a hero in countries such as the newly formed Czechoslovakia and Romania hence the grand title *Scotus Viator*. There is so much more to know about him and his family before and after so we urge you to search the web via your browser to find out more about this illustrious Kyleakin resident.

Two coincidences worth bringing to your attention; Karel Capek is listed as a famous visitor to Kyleakin in Mary Macpherson's *Memories of Kyleakin* recently added to the Home Page of this website and Helen Macrae's photograph features in this Newsletter as part of the article requesting information on *Edradour* - she sits in her garden over the Obbe at Moyle Cottage stealing a few moments in the sunshine with a cup of coffee while in the background her husband Evander's ring-net fishing boats *Fortitude*, *Misty Isle* and *Acorn* lie at the pier (the fact that all three are present dates the photograph to 1962 before the *Acorn* was sold to Bridlington soon after the arrival of the *Fortitude*). (I bet this last comment will spur many old fishermen into disagreeing with my assumptions! *MFM*).

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In April 2014 Robert Muir from Gargunnock visited the village looking for the site where the Bakery stood as his Grandfather was a Baker in Kyleakin around the 1890 – 1900's. Fortunately due to what we had been told while gathering information for the Village Shops article last year Caroline was able to show him where the Bakery was situated behind the former Marine Hotel, now Housing Association flats, next to the Free Church. Robert's Grandfather David Livingstone left Kyleakin around 1900 when he moved south to central Scotland. Could he have been the villages own 'Dr Livingstone' referred to in 'Memories of Kyleakin,' which is now available to read on our website, I wonder?

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In May we received an enquiry from Peter Slimon from Dorset whose father served as Paymaster on HMS Menestheus based at HMS Trelawney (Kyle) during World War II. He emailed photos asking if we could identify the cottage and garden where his mother and other officer's wives stayed during this period. We were able to identify the house as the Gardeners Cottage in the gardens of Dunringell (now The MacKinnon Country House Hotel). As a result and in order to gather more information Peter and his wife Tessa came to Kyleakin where they visited our exhibition at The Bright Water Visitor Centre and then The MacKinnon Hotel where they were delighted to have their photo taken in the same spot where his mother had stood for photographs in the 1940's. This proved to be a very worthwhile trip for the couple who presented us with a photo of Captain Crawford of HMS Menethseus along with memorabilia and information relating to the ship for our collection.



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In June Ruth Macdougall was on duty at the Bright Water Visitor Centre when she had a visit from Derek M Crae and his son Ryan who's Grandfather and Great Grandfather was William Thomson Forsyth (Bill or Willie) and lived with his wife and daughter Jane in Winkle Hall. Bill owned the Skye Marble Quarry in Torrin and Kyle Croft and Dairy with a herd of cattle in Kyleakin along with several other enterprises in the area.

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Also in June we received a query from Trevor and Trish McColm from Queensland, Australia who were coming to the area in July to gather more information on Trevor's Great Grandfather – Robert Hamilton McColm who was Lighthouse Keeper here from 1890 – 1897. We were able to produce copies of birth certificates for two of the children born here and the school roll showing the names of three of the children who attended Kyleakin School which we gave to them when we met up at the Bright Water Visitor Centre. At the Bright Water Centre they could see Robert McColm's name on the register of all the serving Lighthouse Keepers. This was followed by a visit to the Lighthouse, all part of a tour of Lighthouses around the coast where Robert McColm and his family had lived and worked.


If you have any photos and documents of interest to the Society, they can be scanned and returned quickly.

The most recent enquiry was from Cinders McLeod in Canada in the hope that we could point her in the right direction for her genealogy hunt to trace her Granny, Chirsty MacLennan from Lochalsh. Thanks to Anna Belle's knowledge of the area we were able to put Cinders in touch with Isabel Cameron from Drumbuie, who it transpired, was a long lost relative and I believe they spent several days and nights catching up with the family history.

History of Houses in Kyleakin

According to the deeds, Edradour was first registered/built in 1891. Phil and Sue Lyons are the latest owners, moving there in 2006. But what is the history of the house? We know that the previous owners – Mr & Mrs Wright changed the name from Edradour to Tigh na Cala (apparently because they were tea total and didn't want their house linked to the name of a whisky distillery)! Christine McLeod and her family lived here prior to the Wrights – how long did they live there and who lived there before them; who raised the roof to give the house "an upstairs" and when?



Anna Belle's Uncle Lachie (Lachlan Robertson) lived at Edradour whilst he built Mo Dhachaidh next door – do you know when that was and what 'Edradour' was called then?

Sue would like to do a time line on the house from 1891 to date which will serve as a template for future investigations on other houses in the village.

Who knows about your house? Will the history be lost to future generations if you moved away from the area?

In the Spring 2015 newsletter, as well as reporting back on the history of the house now known as 'Edradour', we will try and record the history of the bungalows on the right hand side after you pass the Village Hall – do you live in one of them, if so, you have all winter to search through your paperwork and photographs!
